Wh-Questions



Let's remember how to make questions

Verb to be + Subject + Complement

Is	he	your father?
Are	you	OK?
Am	I	your first love?

Yes/no questions
with 'Verb to be'

Auxiliary verb + Subject + Verb + Complement

Do	you	watch	TV on weekends?
Does	John	read	every day?
Does	she	have	a sister?

Yes/no questions
with other verbs.

Wh- questions



We use Wh- questions to ask for more information than just yes or no.

For example, we can't answer these questions with "yes" or "no".

What is your name?

Where are you?

How old are you?



Wh- questions

Wh- question + Verb to be + Subject + (Complement)

What	is	your favorite colour?	
Why	are	you	late?
Where	are	her books?	

Wh- questions
with 'Verb to be'

Wh- question + Auxiliary verb + Subject + Verb + (Complement)

Why	do	you	cry	every day?
When	do	you	do	your homework?
Where	does	he	live ?	

Wh- questions
with other verbs.

Wh- questions words



We use WHO to ask about a person or people.

Examples:

- Who is your mother?
- Who do you know here?



We use WHAT or WHICH to ask about things or to choose between options.

Examples:

- What do you do on weekends?
- Which is your favorite season?

We use “WHAT” when there are many possible answers.
We use “WHICH” when there are fewer possible answers.



We can also use WHAT + NOUN or WHICH + NOUN to ask for specific information about a thing.

Examples:

- What movie do you want to watch?
- Which subject do you prefer?

Wh- questions words



We use WHY to ask about reasons.

Examples:

- Why are you late?
- Why do you always lie?



We use WHERE to ask about places.

Examples:

- Where is my phone?
- Where do you live?



We use WHEN and WHAT TIME to ask about time.

Examples:

- When is your birthday?
- What time does the lesson start?

“WHEN” is more general.
“WHAT TIME” asks for a specific moment or clock time

Wh- questions words



We use **HOW** to ask about **ways we do something** or how we **feel**.

Examples:

-How are you?

-How do you make spaghetti?



We use **HOW** **OFTEN** to ask about **the frequency of an action**.

Examples:

-How often do you exercise?

-How often does your baby cry?



We use **WHAT TYPE OF / WHAT SORT OF/ WHAT KIND OF** to ask about **types of things**.

Examples:

-What type of clothes does the shop sell?

-What kind of music do you like?

Wh- questions words



We use HOW MANY to ask about the number of people or things (countable)

Examples:

-How many *people* live in your house?

-How many *chairs* are in your classroom?



We use HOW MUCH to ask about the quantity of things (uncountable)

Examples:

-How much *time* do we have?

-How much *protein* do we need?



We use HOW MUCH to ask about the price or cost of something.

Examples:

-How much is this jacket?

-How much do these shoes cost?

Wh- questions words

We can also use HOW to ask for an opinion.

Examples:

- How is the movie?
- How is the food?

We can also use WHICH ONE to ask about a clear few options

Examples:

- Which one do you like?
The green or the red?

We use HOW + ADJECTIVE to ask about size, amount, or level of something

Examples:

- How old are you?
- How tall is your sister?
- How fast do you run?

We use HOW FAR to ask about distance.

Examples:

- How far is your home from here?
- How far does a bullet travel?

Possessive adjectives



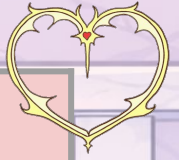
Possessive adjectives are words we use before a noun to show possession.

They always go before a noun.

This is my book.

Your phone is on the table.

This is my. ❌



Subject	Possessive adjective	Example
I	My	My car
You	Your	Your daughters
She	Her	Her dogs
He	His	His son
It	Its	Its eyes
We	Our	Our grandmother
They	Their	Their house

Possessive pronouns

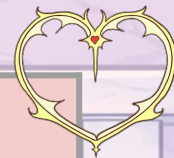


Possessive pronouns are words that replace a noun and show possession, so you don't have to repeat the noun.

They go alone.

This pencil is mine.
That phone is yours.

This is mine pencil. ❌



Subject	Possessive pronoun	Example
I	Mine	These pencils are mine
You	Yours	This is yours
She	Hers	That car is hers
He	His	Those seats are his
It	Its	This bone is its. →
We	Ours	The project is ours
They	Theirs	That house is theirs

Very uncommon!



Subject	Possessive adjective	Possessive pronoun (alone)
I	My ___	Mine
You	Your ___	Yours
She	Her ___	Hers
He	His ___	His
It	Its ___	Its
We	Our ___	Ours
They	Their ___	Theirs
